

### Dear <<First Name>>

This Sunday we will celebrate World Communion Sunday (originally called World Wide Communion Sunday). This particular holy day is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical church. The first celebration occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, in 1933 where Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr served as pastor.

Celebration of World Wide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (US) in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us from the beginning, but it wasn't until 1940 when the Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) promoted extending the celebration to a number of churches around the world that the practice became widespread. Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed.

This Sunday our offerings will go to mission programs particular to this Body. Next Sunday, we will receive the Peace and Global Witness offering – which is traditionally collected on World Communion Sunday.

Why this offering? It is necessary symbolism and an outright invitation to live what we proclaim. The Peace & Global Witness Offering encourages the church to cast off anxiety and fear, discord and division, and embrace our God's mission of reconciliation to those around the corner and around the world. The church's mission in fact is to find and address the anxiety and discord that is prevalent throughout this broken and sinful world. Your offerings equip and train people to do precisely that.

I wonder if it's a coincidence, or not, that World Communion Sunday began in the 1930's, between two world wars. It stood as a banner to the call and purpose of God's people to stand firm during a time where Christianity was being co-opted by other forces. The Theological Declaration of Barmen, found in our confessional standards, is an example of a document adopted by Christians in Nazi Germany during 1934, who opposed the German Christian movement.

I've taken to ask the question recently "How is it that politics are not 'allowed' in the pulpit/religion, but religion/the pulpit has no problem finding a place in politics?"

This is a question we must continue to faithfully wrestle with, as we get a wider glimpse of the pain and suffering and more pain, of the wider world. Join us during World Communion Sunday where we can discover our place in the pain, and yet stand side-by-side, shoulder to shoulder, in the strength of the Spirit.

## **BINGO PRIZES**



## Join the Justice and Advocacy Committee

It's said that the best cure for anxiety is to do something! And there is so much that can be done. Bring your ideas, your curiosity and hope for a better world.

### **Spotlight on God's Creation**

This summer, we've experienced disastrous floods on top of record shattering heat waves that hit much of the US, Europe, and North Africa, creating deadly wildfires in Algeria, Greece, Italy,


Tunisia, and so many more. As long as the climate crisis remains unchecked, these devastating weather events will not just continue but will increase in frequency. Yet, the world's largest banks continue to support the major drivers of the climate crisis, pouring \$668.6 billion into fossil fuel companies last year alone.

The good news is the Fossil Free Finance Act (FFFA), which would require the Federal Reserve to force big banks to stop financing greenhouse gas emissions by 2050, was just reintroduced in Congress. Tell your representatives that we need to pass this bill now so banks stop funding fossil fuel expansion. Massive investment in fossil fuels not only poses a risk for the climate, but for our financial system, as well. As the much-needed and inevitable clean energy transition speeds up, fossil fuel investments become more volatile. And if the Federal Reserve doesn't push banks to adapt and shed emissions-heavy investments, we could see more banks collapse similar to Silicon Valley Bank.

The first step to getting out of a hole is to stop digging it deeper. <u>Demand that your</u> representative co-sponsor and pass the FFFA – for our communities, our planet, and our financial security.



**October 1: The 12 Apostles: "The Sent-Out Ones"** Disciples and Apostles are not necessarily the same. Who were the original Twelve Apostles whom Jesus called to be with Him (the Gospels apparently differ), and what do the Gospels, Church history, Apocrypha, and tradition tell us about their mission and their experiences before and after the Resurrection. *Power-point presentation and film excerpt.*

October 15: Mary Magdalene: Apostle to the Apostles! Part 1 "I have seen the Lord!" Seeing is believing. St. Mary Magdalene, also called Mary of Magdala, (feast day July 22), is one of Jesus' most celebrated disciples—famous, according to Mark 16:9–10 and John 20:14–17, for being the first person to see the resurrected Christ, and then rushing to the Apostles to witness to His Resurrection. (She was also confused and conflated with other individuals in the Gospels.) Her witness and ministry as Apostola ad Apostolos has led many in the Roman Catholic Church to believe that women should be able to serve as priests. Illustrated lecture.

October 22: Mary Magdalene: The New Eve. Part 2 Dulcis Amica Dei. The Magdalen's Veneration in Popular Religion and Art. Mary Magdalene could play a part in popular religion that the Virgin Mary, raised to divinity as Queen of Heaven between the 11th and 14th centuries, could not. While the sinless Virgin was the antithesis of Eve, the Magdalen—as a repentent sinner—represented sexuate femininity redeemed: the New Eve. Tradition has given the Magdalen many other personae, richly preserved in Western art. Illustrated lecture.

A message from St. Wilfrids: As autumn descends upon us, it's time to think about putting away our shorts and t-shirts and getting out our sweaters and pants. But wait! Did you actually wear all the clothes that you are putting away for the winter? What would happen if you decided to donate one (or even five) pieces of warm weather clothing to the impoverished and unsheltered families we serve in North Camden? My guess is that for most of us, they would hardly be missed next spring. Can you also give some thought to the winter clothes you will be pulling out. Can you still stay warm with one or two fewer sweaters? Do you really need four pairs of gloves or a variety of scarves? We are seeking clothing donations for all seasons, all genders and all ages. They can be dropped off in the alcove closest to the playground side entrance.

Our clients continue to need:

- Diapers, size 2-6 in particular
- Baby wipes
- 1 lb bags of dried beans of any variety. If you'd like to donate a larger bag of beans of any size, we will re-portion it into 1 lb bags. Many of the families we serve are of Hispanic heritage and eating Rice and Beans daily is a staple of their tradition. We've got the rice. We need the beans.
