Dear Family of Faith members,

Hymn of the Month: "Let All Things Now Living"

Katherine Kennicott Davis (1892–1980) wrote the text for this Welsh folk melody, {ASH GROVE}, in the 1920s and published it under the pseudonym John Cowley in 1939. She cites the Book of National Songs, a small pamphlet published by Novello and Company, as her source for this tune, and the present harmonization is by Gerald H. Knight (1908–1979). Davis was born in St. Joseph, Missouri, taught at the Shady Hill School for Girls in Philadelphia, and later, received an honorary doctorate from Stetson University. Her composition, "The Little Drummer Boy," also published under a pseudonym, has become a well-loved Christmas carol. "Let All Things Now Living" reminds us of the praise and thanksgiving that we sing to God as God protects, guides, and orders creation.

LIFE AFTER DEATH ADULT EDUCATION SERIES FACILITATED BY REV. DICK RINGENWALD

NOV 5, 12, 20 & 26, DEC 3 & 10

11:15AM-12:15PM — BACK BOARD ROOM

At the core of the Christian faith is God's promise of eternal life. But in a pragmatic world how realistic can this be? In this course we will look at what Christianity fundamentally says about life after death from an academically oriented point of view. We will delve into history, anthropology, archaeology, psychology, comparative religion, physics and of course Scriptural theology to see where some of Christianity's understanding of life after death originates and how it develops and changes over time.

We will talk about the Easter event, judgment, heaven, hell, body/soul dualism, the doctrine of atonement and what eternal life actually means to include what theologians refer to as realized eschatology. We will also take particular note of where Christians differ on these issues. It is our hope that one will come away from these classes with an even more solidly grounded faith in God's extraordinary gift.

URBAN PROMISE BENCH DEDICATION This past year the BOY SCOUTS of Troop 65 Haddonfield have collected 839 lbs. of bottle caps that have been up-cycled into 2 forever PARK BENCHES. All part of their BSA Conservation Award. Several FPC members donated caps and lids. The lids were driven out to Indiana where they were recycled into 2 benches. The bench at the community garden at Urban Promise School was dedicated Oct. 25. The Scouts were so excited and their excitement was contagious! The other bench is at Haddonfield Methodist Church which sponsors the troop. The boys were overwhelmed at the support of so many people who cared enough to donate the lids.

EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT
In the coming months, Alex Dante will be carrying out an Eagle Scout project, which will involve constructing three display cases inside of the coat closet nearest the church office. These display cases will be used to house and exhibit artifacts that are representative of the history of the church. An estimated \$1500 will be needed for the project. Donations would be greatly appreciated. If you wish to donate, checks should be made out to First Presbyterian Church with “Dante Eagle Project” in the



memo line, and directed to the church office. Donors who contribute \$50 or more will be recognized on a plaque near the display.

PER CAPITA CONTRIBUTION UPDATE – As a congregation, we have sent our obligation—\$37,851—to the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the Haddonfield Council of Churches for the year. The total per capita contribution received from our members through 10/8/2017 is \$16,961, a difference of (\$20,890). Please send your per capita dues of \$37.00 per member (not per household) if you have not already done so. This offering insures that your regular pledge dollars will be used for other work and programs in our church.

Thanksgiving Turkey Collection

Since 1980, Your Food Shelf has been helping residents of Camden and the surrounding area avoid hunger. Each year, Your Food Shelf provides emergency food, clothing & household items to 1,500 seniors, families and children in need. Each food bag distributed provides a typical family of four with three meals a day for three days. In the

summer months, our Farmer’s Market offers free, fresh produce to the seniors and families we serve to ensure they have access to healthy foods. Your food Shelf is located at 1500 Federal Street in Camden and is open Tuesday – Friday from 10 am – 3:00 pm. We will be collecting Turkeys for this worthwhile Presbyterian based organization Sunday,

November 19, from about 8:15 AM until noon. There will also be room in one of the Church’s freezers. Cash donations will also be accepted.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Over the years, our PW members have given generously of their time and talents as well as monetary contributions to help others here and around the world. Through individual pledges, memorial funds, bequests, and sales projects, such as the **Coffee Project** and the **Strawberry Festival**, our PW has been able to contribute to various local charities. Their special mission giving has benefited **Urban Promise Wellness, New Visions, the Fresh Air Home, Guatemala Milk Fund, Kid's Alley, Caring Hearts Ministry, Your Food Shelf, Interfaith Caregivers, migrant grooming kits, St. Wilfred's, Distributing Dignity, the Cathedral Kitchen and Knitting for Peace**. An Urban Promise student is being sponsored and an ongoing Kiva program is in operation.

Our PW also participates in special offerings. Every fall we join in the **"Thank Offering,"** a tradition started in 1888 when a day was set aside as a day of prayer and thanksgiving and women were asked to contribute an extra dollar as a "thank offering to the Lord." Since then, Presbyterian Women have supported this mission worldwide. This year fifteen projects have been chosen for grants; five will go to international projects and ten will be given to serve people in need in the United States. In nearby Phoenixville, PA, for example, the Women's Outreach Shelter will be able to increase security for its house by the installation of security cameras, lighting and motion detectors.

In the spring, the **"Birthday Offering"** is collected. This tradition was started in 1922 when a woman who had been visiting mission stations in Japan saw a need to improve the facilities there. When she returned home, she challenged the women of the church to give a penny for each year of their lives as a "Birthday Gift" to those school girls in Japan. The practice continues today, enabling the PW to offer assistance both here and overseas for projects not supported by the General Assembly. Last spring's 2017 offering has provided water systems for a Navajo Reservation in New Mexico, has helped provide a larger facility for a home in South Carolina which is a safe haven for victims of domestic violence and has helped establish medical clinics in rural Presbyterian Churches in Cuba.

At Circle meetings throughout the year, women contribute to **"The Fellowship of the Least Coin."** Started in India sixty-one years ago to give all members a sense of being part of a worldwide family as they pray for peace, the practice continues today as a global ecumenical prayer movement. The coins symbolize prayers from around the world and become a symbol of our oneness in the common quest for peace, justice and reconciliation. The coins are then used for grants for special projects of service and relief around the world,

OUR ONGOING KNITTING PROJECTS

Members of Circle 1 are continuing to knit, crochet and quilt items which are then sent to needy areas. Several sleeping mats have gone to Swaziland to be used by AIDS orphans, and members continue to work for future situations. At this time, they are making t-shirt dresses and knitting items to be used in the coming cooler weather.

Last year we had reminded our readers that they too could help others by knitting or crocheting items which would be donated where needed. Dorothy Alff responded with a total of 27 pieces which she had created – mittens, hats, scarves, shawls, blankets, booties and other baby items. We are grateful for her dedication and thoughtfulness.

Can you knit or crochet? If so, you too can make an impact. For more information, telephone Sue Smith, 546-8482 or go to the website, www.knitting4peace.com where you'll find patterns for all requested items. A special **knitting group** in our church is open to all on **Monday mornings between 9:30 and 12:30**. Come out to enjoy the camaraderie of the group.

Knitting4Peace is a non-profit organization "dedicated to crafting hope, healing and peace one stitch at a time." As members work, they pray for each other and for the recipients as well as for peace.

The “Good Ladies”

Jesus said, “I was in prison and you visited me.”

Matthew 25:26b

Every Friday a team of ordinary women drive into Camden to fulfill an extraordinary biblical imperative. Called “Good Ladies” for over 50 years and armed with a few puzzles and an excess of warm thoughts we bring hope and encouragement to the women detained in the Camden County Correctional Facility. It does not take a theological degree or advanced pastoral care training to take Jesus’ message to our sisters caught by their circumstances and decisions in a dismal place.

They often relate to us their gratitude for our visit but we are equally blessed by the time spent with them. They sing joyfully and pray earnestly. Many have been well churched and all are looking to get back to something more meaningful in their lives. But for their incarceration they are much like the rest of us.

The Good Ladies team is small and we sometimes struggle to have enough members to go every week. It doesn’t take unusual talent or even a silver tongue to join this ministry. The requirement is only a loving and giving heart. The team would be grateful for anyone who would like to volunteer even once a month. We leave the church on Friday mornings at 8:45 AM and are usually back by 11:30. There is room in the car for you. You may contact any of us for information (Judy Blank, Carol Carty, Janet Lehman, Judy Grantham and Isabel Pross).

Becky’s Blog: *What Color Would You Choose?*

The hands were bright orange, because orange represents feeling thoughtful. He is thoughtful when he uses his hands to help his brother, sister and mom.

Another set of hands were dark red, the color of anger, for when she wants to punch something. “My hands get hot and I want to yell.”



Each therapy sheet is a rainbow of colors in human form, representing emotions each child feels often and where they feel them in their bodies. “When I’m happy, my chest and stomach feel full of energy.” “When I’m scared, my heart beats fast and my chest hurts.” These sheets give us insights into each precious life and helps us to better understand behavior. This is trauma-informed practice, asking, “what happened to you?”

instead of “what’s wrong with you?” And it’s teaching kids to use their words instead of their red fists!

We have Libby Whitman to thank for this. Libby officially started as our mental health clinician just a month ago, though really, she’s been involved for a year now, having done an internship at CamdenForward School in her last year of graduate school. Libby graduated with her master’s in counseling from Westminster Seminary. She spent all summer collecting resources to use here

at UrbanPromise, and our classroom walls all boast posters showing breath practices. The wellness room at our high school has a poster showing brain states and ways kids can self-regulate to get themselves back up from an alarmed state to rational thinking again. Teachers and students understanding that exhaling

longer than inhaling is calming, while a longer inhale is energizing. Third grade is meeting as a class once a week to learn the difference between tattling and when it’s right to tell an adult something. Libby has checked in with every new student this year from k-12, helping to assure a smooth transition. And in between all of these commitments she is providing individual counseling as well as doing classroom check-ins.

I’m always worrying that Libby is doing too much, but, so far, she says she is happy and excited every day when she arrives here. She has so many gifts to share and our UrbanPromise community is blessed by her presence. So, welcome Libby! We are most thankful for you.
