

This Week in Sunday School 1.10.21 - Jesus is Baptized

Happy Sunday, Friends,

Today we're going to talk about baptisms. Baptism days are some of my very favorite days at church. I love everything about a baptism. I love the parents' silent prayers and mild panic hoping everything will go smoothly (spoiler alert: it usually doesn't). I love when older siblings go rogue.
