SAILBOAT CHURCH

Since the early days of Christianity, the church has been depicted as a boat in Christian art and literature. But what kind of boat are we? Is our church a rowboat or a sailboat?


If you attended one of our Lenten book club groups, you've been thinking about that question for a while now. You've read Joan Gray's book *Sailboat Church*. Gray, a Presbyterian minister and former Moderator of the General Assembly, argues that many congregations are like rowboats. We rely on human power to get where we are going. The problem is, when the seas get rough or adverse winds blow, we get tired and blown off course. Gray encourages us to be a sailboat church. In the original languages of the scriptures, the word for wind, breath, and spirit is the same. Sailboat churches rely on the power of the Holy Spirit to get them where they're going. Sailing a ship does require work, as anyone who's ever gone sailing can attest, but it is work that harnesses and relies on a more powerful force than mere human effort. Gray encourages churches to prioritize prayer, trust, and obedience in their decision making, and let these disciplines set the agenda for budgeting, volunteer recruitment, and facilities maintenance, not the other way around.

Lent is over, but our *Sailboat Church* conversation is continuing! I invite all of you, whether you've read *Sailboat Church* or not, to stay after worship on April 23 for a *Sailboat Church* conversation. We're going to gather in the Hospitality Room in the basement at 11:15. As the scriptures say, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." What is the Spirit of Christ strengthening us to do? How will we raise a sail together and harness the power of the Spirit? Let's talk about that this Sunday.

HOW DO YOU STEWARD GOD'S EARTH?


EARTH DAY IS THIS SATURDAY APRIL 22, 2023


HOSPITALITY UPDATE

ST. WILFRID'S OPEN DOOR CLINIC UPDATE

You can feel a new energy in the church as FPCH renews it commitment to be in direct service to the hungry, the thirsty, the poor, the needy or those otherwise distressed. There are so many opportunities for church members of varying talents to ride this wave. Volunteering at The Open Door Clinic at St. Wilfrid's in Camden might be the perfect starting point. The Open Door Clinic provides a variety of dearly needed items and services topped with abundant love that allows our client families to thrive.


In March our volunteers provided assistance to 1286 impoverished people, a third of them children. So what do our volunteers actually do?

- One Friday a month 10 people with cars descend on the Food Bank of South Jersey to load between 3-5 tons of food and supplies into their vehicles and transport them to St. Wilfrid's which is about 10 minutes away. Typically it takes 1.5 - 2 hours. All you need is a vehicle. The ability to lift or carry is not required. Want to know more about this assignment? Among the people you can ask are Alan Stedman, Doug Barber, Rose Guthrie, Lesley Kirsch, Joan Fiorella and Joyce & Bill Stout.
- Every other Saturday volunteers arrive at St. Wilfrid's starting around 8:15 am. Jobs that need to be done include:
 - Packing bags full of food ask Kae Fretz and John Reed
 - Sorting through donated clothing ask Joan F., Corey Crumley and Caroline Yount
 - Assisting our clients in choosing clothing that works for them ask Marsha Reed
 - Sorting through food and hygiene donations made by individuals Melinda Lamb

There is a job for everyone - sitting or standing, inside or outside, client-facing or behind-the-scenes. Stay as long as you can. There are no fixed shifts. Have a spare hour? We can put it to good use. Have the whole morning free? We can use your talents from 8:15 am - 11:30 am. Volunteers must be at least 12 years old. If under 16 years old they must be accompanied by an adult.
