Dear Friend,

Harder, easier and more convenient

Consider the windows on a car.

First, they were manually clipped into place.

And then they were hand-rolled into position. But that was too difficult.

So the electric window was born.



It's easy to see the trend toward convenience in many areas of our lives. Sociologists have pointed out that people will trade privacy, money or friendships in exchange for convenience.

I'm not old enough to remember windows that clipped into place, but have owned cars that had hand-rolled windows and remember the magic of electric windows! Luxury!

We do live in a world of increasing convenience. Most of us carry around a powerful computer in our pockets which is also a phone, high-quality camera, and all-around knowledge base! How many times have we been asked or wondered something only to immediately reach for our phones and Google? Shopping is now a matter of browsing -- not racks in department stores -- but Amazon, Etsy, or any other major retailer. We take two-day delivery as standard and can get most things overnight. No longer do we have to schlep to movie theaters -- we can see what we want on flat pieces of glass on our living room walls or tablets on our laps.

Consider communication and the evolution we've all experienced. Texting is now *de rigueur* and a phone call seems charmingly old-fashioned. Meetings are via Zoom or Facetime. Sure, the pandemic has exacerbated the lack of in-person gatherings, but if anything, it just sped up the inevitable.

Yet, all of the above is but a prelude to a paean to the inconvenient methods I hope we preserve. Notably, two things:

1. In praise of the simple hand-written note. Some things simply need to be expressed in one's own hand (preferably with a fountain pen on good stationery), two of which are gratitude and sympathy. A well-phrased "thank you" note is a treat and a thoughtful note of condolence is especially meaningful and hopefully comforting. Hand-written notes are clearly not as convenient as dashing off a text (with or without emoji) but there are times that inconvenience is the point.







2. Good old-fashioned church services on hard pews in wellappointed churches with hymnals (can we talk about upgrading to the current one?) and Bibles and bulletins and collection plates and ushers and organs and choirs and bells and preachers in stuffy robes! Yes, all of these are anachronisms and all are inconvenient (to say nothing of expensive!) -- yet nothing replaces the experience of people gathered for worship --

singing, praying, laughing -- hearts unified and uplifted beyond themselves. There are lots and lots of more convenient ways to do what we do on Sunday mornings but none improve or enhance and all are deficient, at least IMHO!

There are times that the cost of convenience in terms of money, privacy, or relationships is too great and taking the inconvenient route is the better, often untaken, road.

BeSMART PRESENTATION SUNDAY, JAN. 23 @ 11:30



ST. WILFRID'S OPEN DOOR CLINIC

This week marked the 92nd week that the Open Door distributed food during the Pandemic. 62 bags were given out, over 8,873 total! Over 221,825 pounds of food and dry goods have been distributed by the all-volunteer, everything-donated, nobody-gets-paid Open Door Clinic at St Wilfrid's. Thank you for your generous collections and contributions!

More volunteers are needed on Saturday mornings to set up at 8:30 a.m. Distribution of food and winter coats, etc. begins about 9:15. AND more volunteers are needed to pick up food and dry goods at the Foodbank of South Jersey on Fridays (usually about 8:00 at the Foodbank and 8:30 at St Wilfrid's to unload and store). If you can help on Saturday mornings or on Fridays, come join the team! Contact Paul Urian at <u>umanpaul@me.com</u>. The next pickup is Thursday (not Friday), January 20th.

NEEDS:

Coats: all sizes from 24 months to XXX large, and sweatshirts and pants for extra layers. It's cold, and landlords keep heat at 55 degrees, so sometimes coats, etc. are worn indoors. Items may be

dropped off weekdays on Corey Crumley's porch (40 Warwick Road Haddonfield) or Sundays in the alcove behind the parlor at FPCH.

Food Needs: tuna, tomato sauce (no glass jars please), cold cereal, toothpaste and toothbrushes, diapers (sizes 5 and 6), wipes, and more wipes. And we always need plastic grocery bags from Shoprite or Wegman's, paper grocery bags to line the plastic bags, and newspaper bags to hold hygiene items. If you see toiletries (bars of soap, toothpaste, shampoo, deodorant, hygiene pads or adult diapers size large) on sale, we give these items as needed to our clients. Items may be dropped off weekdays on the steps of the PATCO side of Grace Episcopal Church or on Sundays in the alcove between the parlor and the Sanctuary or after church at the door to the office on the Masonic Temple side.

OTHER ST. WILFRID NEEDS: 300 PB&J sandwiches are given out each week. Can you believe almost 15,000 PB&J sandwiches have been given away during the Pandemic and it is still everyone's favorite sandwich?! **We are looking for peanut butter and jelly sandwich makers.** Scouts?
