I'm a big fan of minimalism, of shedding unneeded, unwanted, unnecessary stuff (and not just physical stuff!) which drags down our lives and clutters all aspects of our existence. I cull my possessions every couple of years and if I have haven't used, worn, or needed something it typically goes into a donate or throw pile. There are exceptions, of course, and those are things that bring me happiness: photos, mementos, art, books, tech stuff, and office supplies! Consequently, I'm drawn to articles about down-sizing and decluttering, hence, the title of this post! I lifted it from a *New York Times* article of the same name!



Here's how it starts:

Cleaning out a home can be a morbid, depressing task, often best left until after you're gone, when it's no longer your problem. But what if you decide to tackle the chore now, while you're still here to make the decisions?

As we begin to emerge from a long and deadly pandemic, some older Americans have decided to do just that.

Professional home organizers are reporting a spike in calls from older customers asking for help sorting through their belongings, seeking to dole out the heirlooms and sentimental items and toss the excess. The mood, organizers say, is largely upbeat, with people eager to part with china, furniture and photographs. In some cases, the inquiries come from grown children on behalf of their aging parents, keen to get ahead on the task so they don't have to do it alone later.

You may be aware that I was out of town last Sunday. I was in Milwaukee, WI, officiating at a funeral for a long-term friend's mother, Janeth. She and her family were intentional about thinning out her stuff and also designating specific items to children and adult grandchildren. To my delight, Janeth remembered that I admired a coat rack years and years ago and designated it for me.



Cleaning out her large retirement community apartment was fairly easy — mostly because they did the work ahead of time and Janeth had the fun of deciding who got what!

The article raised yet another valid point:

In that case, we should have the courtesy to not burden our loved ones with a lifetime of clutter. "I don't think that's nice to leave that to your own children," said Ms. Magnusson, who also suggested tossing any letters or journals that might offend your children, should they eventually discover them. Simply put, we should be preparing for the end throughout our lives, pruning as we go.

Tossing anything that might be controversial or disturbing is hugely important. You won't be there to explain or discuss and no one can control how something is received or interpreted!

Lent is the perfect time to take stock of our stuff — to evaluate and consider — and in the process free ourselves from lugging it around! Maybe what we should all give up for Lent are all of the unopened boxes in our basements and attics!

March 12th will mark the 100th Saturday of the weekly distribution of food at the Open Door Clinic at St. Wilfrid's. 100 WEEKS. That's quite a statement as to what muscles the volunteers are exercising. Congratulations! Last Saturday was the 99th week that the Open Door Clinic at St Wilfrid's has distributed food during the pandemic;113 bags, 9,640 total. Over 241,000 pounds of food and dry goods, distributed by the all-volunteer, everything-donated, nobody-gets-paid Open Door Clinic at St. Wilfrid's. Thank you all for your generous collections and contributions!

Foodbank: **Friday, March 25th** will be the next pickup.
