

Important Update from Lee and the COVID Response Team:

After much discussion and deliberation, the COVID Response Team (CRT) has voted to remove the vaccine and mask mandates for entering the church and participating in worship starting **Monday**, **March 21, 2022**. At the same time, we strongly recommend all unvaccinated congregants to wear a mask for their protection and the protection of other persons. We are also recommending that the ushers designate an area of the sanctuary to be reserved for people wishing to participate but who wish to be slightly more removed from the rest of the congregation. This area would be designated as a "Mask Required" area. Masks are still encouraged for *anyone* who feels more comfortable attending worship. Additionally, when possible, seating in every other pew will still be encouraged. Singing and all other parts of worship are to be reinstated.

This decision was made based upon the drastic reduction in cases, the lack of another significant variant to replace Omicron, the changing of the CDC and State guidelines, and the designation of Camden County as "green", meaning low rates of transmission.

We are hopeful that this COVID "pandemic" is finally evolving into an "endemic; but the CRT will remain vigilant and react to changes as we have since this crisis began.



We appreciate the congregation's cooperation as we make changes to the guidelines with the sole purpose of keeping everyone safe while we praise God as a community of faith.

This week marks the **100th week** that the Open-Door Clinic at St Wilfrid's has distributed food during the pandemic; **86 bags again, 9,726 total**, in the cold, sleet/rain/ice/snow of Saturday. Over 243,150 pounds of food and dry goods, distributed by the all-volunteer, everything-donated, nobody-gets-paid Open Door Clinic at St. Wilfrid's. A special thanks to all the volunteers who traveled to St Wilfrid's Saturday in terrible weather, rain and sleet, and made their way home in the ice and snow. The Open Door Clinic at St Wilfrid's is a very special calling for some very special people. And, as always, thank you all for your generous collections and contributions!

Foodbank: Help is needed to pick up food in April at the Foodbank of SJ on Fridays...at a little after 8:00 a.m., and then to deliver to St Wilfrid's about 8:30. 


Peter spent most of his professional life with Warner Brothers in the recording and home video industries, until stepping down to assist his aging parents.
