That quote is by Rep. Maxine Waters (Dem, California's 43rd), and given the deadly insurrection of January 6th in Washington DC, one might leap to the conclusion that she's speaking of that. Alas, she is not. The quote comes from a daily calendar (April 7) which was produced in 2020.A large component of maturity is recognizing where those lines are and having the self-control to respect them.



Rep. Waters' quote is a classic reminder that there are lines in life. (Yes — there are also lanes...!)

We can want something very badly (in Bible-talk "covet"), but stealing crosses the line.

We can be frustrated with someone, but gossip crosses the line.

We can be attracted to another person, but cheating on our spouse or partner crosses the line.

We can wish we could write like someone else, but plagiarizing crosses the line.

We can be in a huge hurry, but speeding crosses the line.

We can be very, very tired of the pandemic, but refusing to wear a proper mask crosses the line.

You get the point.

The whole idea behind most rules and regulations is to protect the community. Witness the Ten Commandments and the 613 regulations in the Hebrew Scriptures. Their existence points to the need of securing the safety and integrity of the community — its members (especially those at the lowest end of affluence and power) and its structure. Those admonitions paint a clear line across which we may not travel — and if we do — we are aware of consequences from mild to severe.

Grateful to live in a free society, grateful for our rule of law, grateful for our *Book of Order*, grateful for fellow travelers, and most of all, grateful for a God whose love often presents itself in the form of clear lines!

PINWHEELS FOR PREVENTION



Once again Presbyterian Women is creating a pinwheel garden in April for the observance of National Child Abuse Prevention month. It is a program of *Prevent Child Abuse-New Jersey (PCA-NJ)* which promotes great childhoods, positive parenting and healthy child development. Founded in 1979, all their efforts throughout the state are dedicated to preventing child abuse and neglect in all forms for all New Jersey children. April is the national observation of Child Abuse Prevention Month. During this time, PCA-NJ implements its "Pinwheels for Prevention" campaign. The pinwheel is in their logo and was

chosen as a national symbol of prevention because it is whimsical and evokes childlike notions – so it is a good emblem of the "Great Childhoods" that is desired for all children.

This week marks the 55th straight week that the Open-Door Clinic at St Wilfrid's has distributed food during the pandemic: 90 bags on April 3, 5,102 total. Over 127,550 pounds of food and dry goods, distributed by the all-volunteer, everything-donated, nobody-gets-paid, Open Door Clinic at St. Wilfrid's. AND.....120 Easter bags were given out!

The first pick-up in May is the 7th. Volunteers also needed to be "on call" to pick up 100 or so loaves of bread at a home on Grove Street in Haddonfield. Is there a day you are usually free...Tuesdays, Wednesdays, or Thursdays? When bread is available that day, you would be called to pick it up. (The bread will be picked up few hours later from your house and taken to St Wilfrid's.) Please call Jill Mascena if you are interested in helping this way or need more details. NEEDS: Again this week, we could use canned peas, canned carrots, canned mixed vegetables, pasta and sauce, diapers—sizes 5&6 for kids and L & XL for adults, and wipes. Items may be dropped off at the drive-though on Sundays after church OR weekdays in bin behind Grace Episcopal Church.
