WE ARE FAMILY!! (...but is that really a good idea?)

We are family
I got all my sisters with me
We are family
Get up everybody and sing



Of the many things I've learned about First Presbyterian throughout the last 11 months is the importance of family — in Haddonfield and in the church.

I frequently hear members describe the "family atmosphere" or that the congregation is "really a family." A prominent line on a "welcome" page on the church's website states: **"Come to visit and stay to become part of this family of faith."**

This email message will likely get me labeled as "anti-family" by some readers so let me offer this caveat: I love my family and consider that collection of people to be among God's greatest gifts in my life. I don't doubt for a second that the vast majority of you feel the same way about yours. Families are great (mostly), but congregations are not families.

Here's why:

- 1. By definition, "family" sets up boundaries. Everyone knows if they are a part of a family or not. It's not permeable and inclusion is not voluntary one must be accepted or born into a family. Additionally, not everyone is on equal footing in a family; some have more power and influence than others. That doesn't resemble the community of radical inclusion envisioned by Jesus.
- 2. "Family" is a loaded word and sends messages we likely don't intend. I'd suggest that no one hears or uses the word without some emotional attachment or reaction. It's a visceral word and we have no control over how it's received. Entire swaths of our society have been excluded by organizations purporting to uphold the primacy of families. Not everyone comes from a wonderful family some have had horrific experiences consequently, we should reconsider its use.
- 3. First Presbyterian is just too big to pretend it's a family. Yes, you may have actual relatives who are also members, you may be part of a legacy of membership, and you may have developed friendships that feel as close as a siblings but friends there are supposedly 700 of you!

What's the alternative?

The most obvious is to delete "family" and refer to ourselves as a "community" — which is what we are. Simple definition of "community": A unified body of individuals: such as the people with common interests living in a particular area.



- Communities are permeable folks move in and out without barriers or boundaries.
- Communities do not require hierarchy everyone is equal while some may have specific roles or responsibilities.

- Communities focus on a common good or goal or purpose.
- The word, "community" is neutral there's no visceral or emotional response per se.

To push a little further, I like to think of the church as a "tribe"! (Thanks to Seth Godin for this definition.)

"A tribe is a group of people connected to one another, connected to a leader, and connected to an idea."

"A group needs only two things to be a tribe: a shared interest and a way to communicate."

"Tribes need leadership. Sometimes one person leads, sometimes more. People want connection and growth and something new. They want change."

Doesn't that sound like a congregation — at least one that's vibrant, aware, and motivated to express its faith in tangible ways? It does to me.

What do you think? Is FPCH a family? a community? a tribe? all of the above? none of the above?

CALLING HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS - IT'S DEACONS SCHOLARSHIP TIME!




Summer worship begins in Fellowship Hall in two weeks. Watch for information about the FPCH Covid Response Team's careful planning to make this return both joyous and safe.


THE CHURCH'S RE-OPENING INCLUDES BEAUTIFUL BUILDING UPDATES

As we all look forward to worshipping together in person, Pastor Doug has tasked the church's Building Manager, Travis Bogetti, with renovating and repurposing areas in our church which will allow us to safely carry out our plans to re-open and give our various ministries the spaces needed to carry out their future plans.

Our first in-person gathering will take place in Fellowship Hall on May 30th. To prepare for the service, Travis, has worked tirelessly to transform Fellowship Hall into a refreshed place with polished floors, clean windows, and organized space (photo right). Fellowship Hall can now be considered both new and familiar, and with the work that's been done members can enter knowing that they gather in a safe and comfortable space.

In addition to the changes that have taken place in Fellowship Hall, other rooms on the lower level have also received a fresh facelift. The rooms formerly known as the yoga room (photos 1 and 2) and the children's church room (photos 3 and 4) were treated to a deep cleaning, polished floors, and a paint job. New furniture will be added to provide space for youth Sunday School and for a dedicated youth "hang-out" room. Gab and the Youth Ministry team are thrilled they can re-organize the rooms in a way that makes sense for a variety of needs.





Finally, the Hospitality Center (not yet pictured) has been cleaned and updated. It remains a multi-use space for classes, VBS, meetings, the quilters, and other needs as they arise. This is what's been happening since the church has been closed; look for more updates to come.

ST. WILFRID'S OPEN DOOR CLINIC

One of our long time clients, who is an alcoholic and has liver cancer, told us her 22-year-old daughter died from an overdose. Velma's description of her daughter's passing made it sound like a normal, regular event; this is Camden. Losing a child is not a regular event for any parent, but in Camden, sadly, it seems to be. There is a reason that we volunteers are here and that she keeps coming every time we are open. She even prayed short prayers when we had prayer circles before the Pandemic. Please pray for her.

This week marks the **61st straight week** that the Open Door Clinic at St Wilfrid's has distributed food during the pandemic; **82 bags, 5,654 total. Over 141,350 pounds** of food and dry goods, distributed by the all-volunteer, everything donated, nobody gets paid, Open Door Clinic at St. Wilfrid's. Thank you all for your generous collections and contributions.

NEEDS: canned fruit, boxes of cereal, spaghetti sauce, bars of soap, deodorant. Also sandwich bags and gallon twist tie plastic bags. Also, we are beginning to collect box fans and backpacks. Items may be dropped off during the week in bins behind Grace Episcopal Church or during the drive-through at FPCH after the service Sundays from 11-12.
