The Unexamined Life Is Not Worth Living (Socrates)

At dinner last evening with two of my favorite people, one of them told of planning an online reunion for her graduating class from an allgirls boarding school. The alums are now mostly "post-retirement" age and living into that segment of their lives. My friends, a couple I married a year ago in the midst of COVID and who were both recent widow/ers, are the kind of people who thrive on pondering life's deepest questions. They love a thoughtful conversation, and we're close enough to trust each other with our vulnerability.



Hence, I wasn't at all surprised when we were presented with the first two of nine questions which were crafted as a component of the virtual reunion.

- Number 1: What are the challenges, large and small, that you are working on, trying to achieve, or coping with at this point in your life?
- Number 2: As you have gotten older, what is something you have moved on from that once meant the world to you, or something that is increasingly important that once was less so?

Granted, these questions were written to be posed to folks in their 70s, but they apply to anyone of any age.

What are the challenges of your life right now?

- Raising a family?
- Caring for parents or an aging spouse?
- Addiction?
- Physical and/or mental health issues?
- Financial woes?
- Relationship turmoil, tension, or lack of interest?
- Legal entanglements?
- Boredom, anxiety, or lack of purpose?
- Staying focused on your core goals and priorities?

- Work/family/play/self balance?
- Employment under/un/over?
- School?
- Letting kids grow up and out? or "failure to launch?"

The first challenge of any of these is following Socrates' advice — examine our lives and take a brutally honest inventory. Perhaps do that with a trusted

friend/spouse/parent/therapist. As you do, reflect on question Number 2 — chances are the stuff we worry about today will be forgotten a year from now. My corollary to Socrates would be this: Just keep things in perspective!

Lastly, as you consider your life and its challenges, I'd invite you to read Psalm 130 - it's only eight verses - and see if you discover a kindred spirit in the psalmist!

WEAR ORANGE DAY JUNE 6

On Sunday, orange ribbons and bows will be around the church for Wear Orange Day in honor of victims of gun violence. National Gun Violence Awareness week will follow. Wearing orange or decorating your home in orange helps draw attention to this serious crisis. The PCUSA Office of Public Witness calls gun violence in America "a national sin". It devastates people from every demographic. Those who also suffer the impact of systemic racism are even more vulnerable. The trauma inflicted on survivors and communities by gun violence lasts for generations. The Mission Committee and the Justice and

Advocacy Committee have distributed information on the Be SMART for Kids initiative over the last three years. Have you taken action to protect your family? Have you shared the information with your neighbors and co-workers? If not, now is the time to do it! We all want our children to grow up happy and healthy. Beginning Wednesday, June 16th at 7:30, Pastor Nikki will be offering a book study on Richard Rohr's Breathing Under Water: Spirituality and the Twelve Steps.

From the book blurb:

"We are all addicted to something, according to Franciscan Father Richard Rohr. When we learn to identify our addiction, embrace our brokenness, and surrender to God, we begin to bring healing to ourselves and our world. In this book, Richard Rohr shows how the gospel principles in the Twelve Steps can free anyone from any addiction - from an obvious dependence on alcohol or drugs, to the more common but less visible addiction that we all have to sin."

CONVERSATION ON RACE





At St. Wilfrid's Open Door Clinic. With teamwork, there is a satisfaction of working for the whole and not oneself; loving others as we love ourselves...GOD AT WORK!

This week marks the **63rd straight week** that the Open Door Clinic at St Wilfrid's has distributed food during the pandemic; **78 bags, 5,842 total. Over 146,050 pounds** of food and dry goods, distributed by the all-volunteer, everything donated, nobody gets paid Open Door Clinic at St. Wilfrid's. In the Pouring Rain! Thank you all for your generous collections and contributions.

CURRENT NEEDS: We are very low on diapers—sizes 4,5, & 6-and adult sizes large and extralarge—and baby wipes. If you would like to donate these in bulk from Amazon or Walmart, you may have your order sent to: Corey Crumley, 40 Warwick Rd, Haddonfield, NJ 08033.

NEW REQUEST: It appears that there will be some upcoming changes at the food bank, reverting to pre-pandemic practices. As we prepare for the future, we are looking for iPads, not too old, for intakes in the future. iPads may also be dropped off at Corey's house

OTHER NEEDS are canned fruits and veggies, cold cereal, deodorant, toothpaste, and toothbrushes.
